Presentation Summary

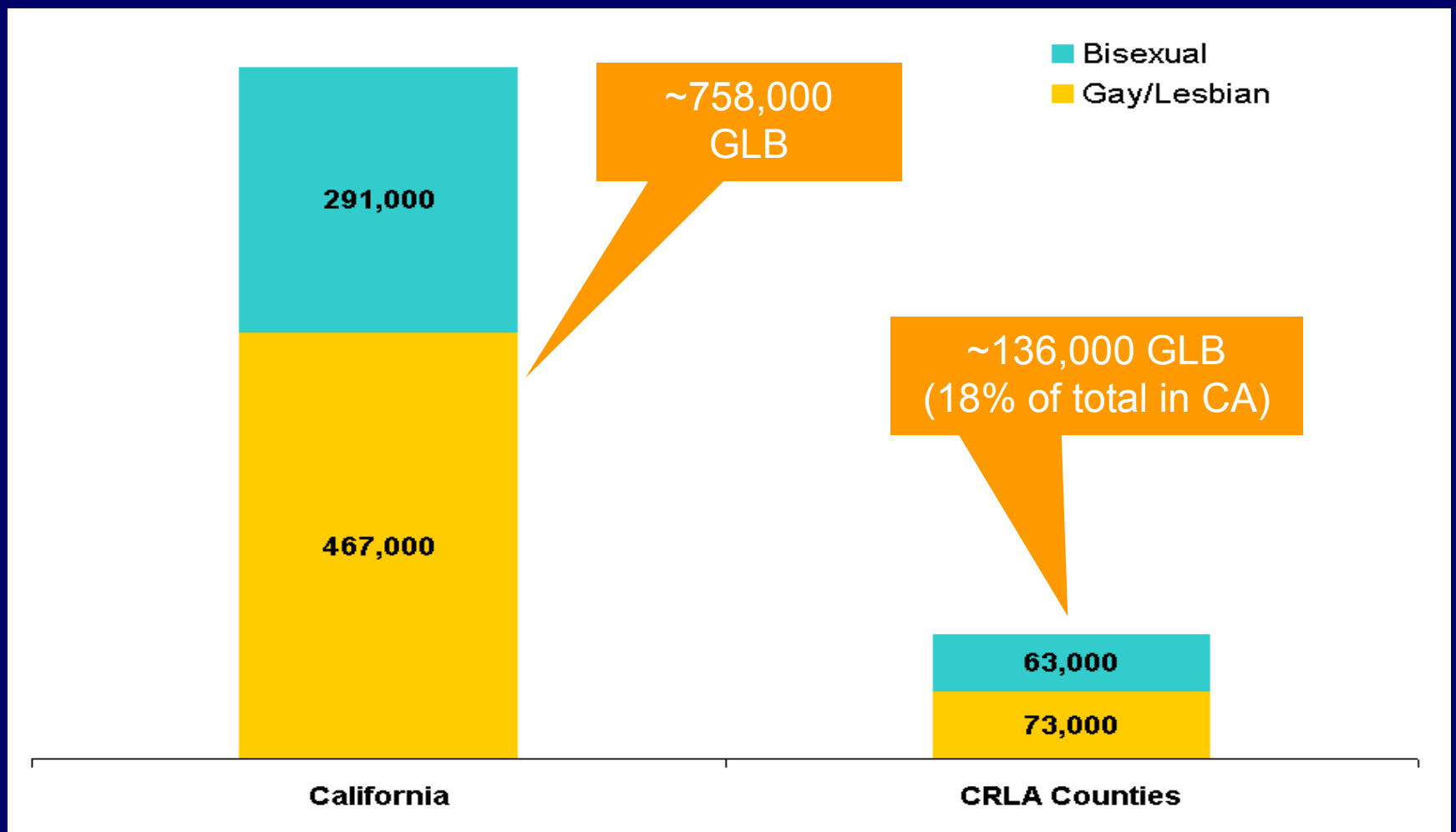
- Describe demographic characteristics of GLB people and same-sex couples in California and in CRLA counties
 - Fresno, Imperial, Kern, Kings, Madera, Merced, Monterey, Napa, Riverside, San Benito, San Joaquin, San Luis, Obispo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tulare, Ventura, Yuba
 - San Diego excluded as it is the most urban of the counties



Data Sources

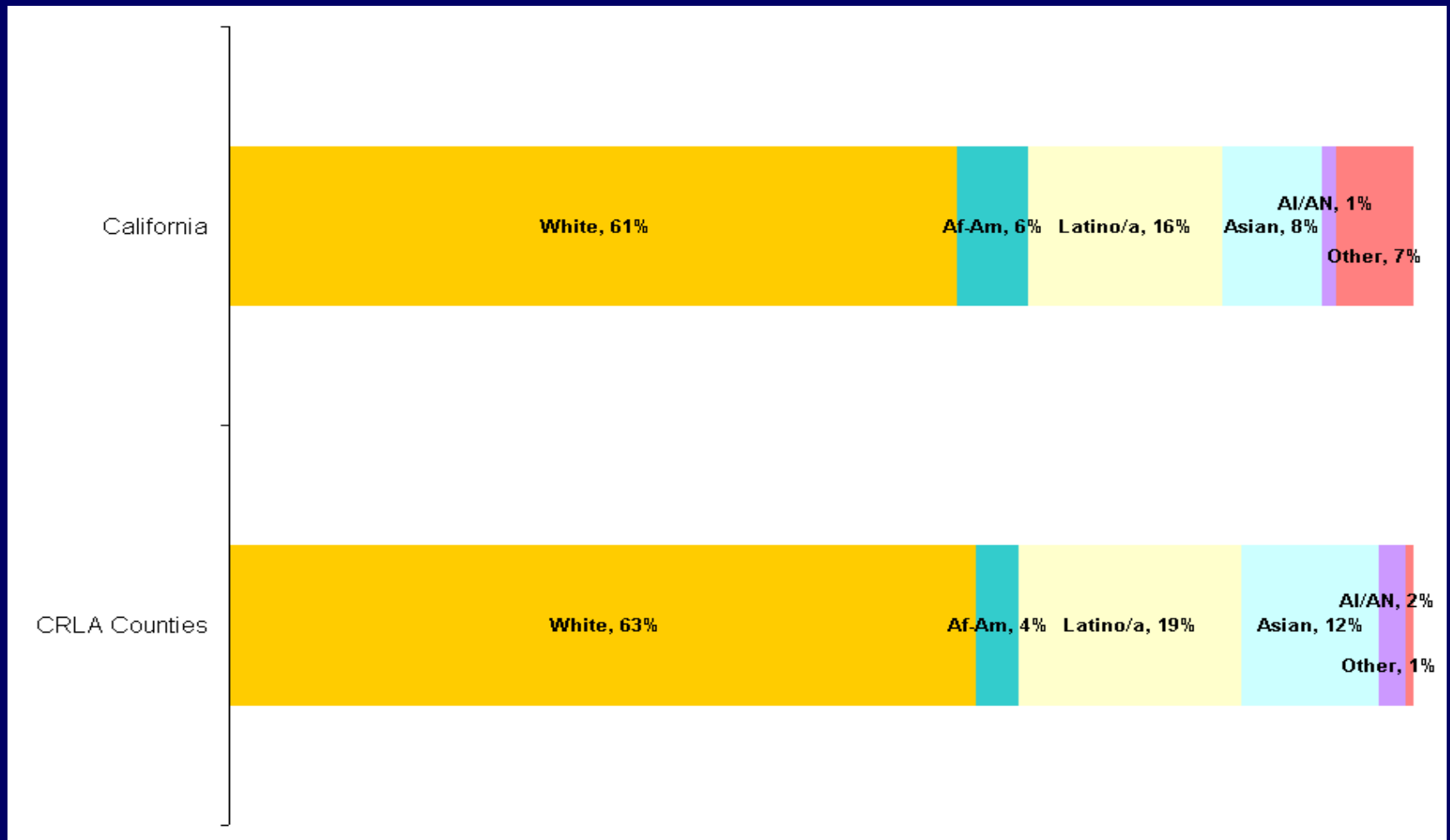
- California Health Interview Survey, 2005
 - Survey of California residents that directly asks sexual orientation
- U.S. Census Bureau: Census 2000 and American Community Survey, 2005-2006
 - Same-sex couples where one partner is identified as the “husband/wife” or “unmarried partner” of the other partner

How many GLB people are there?



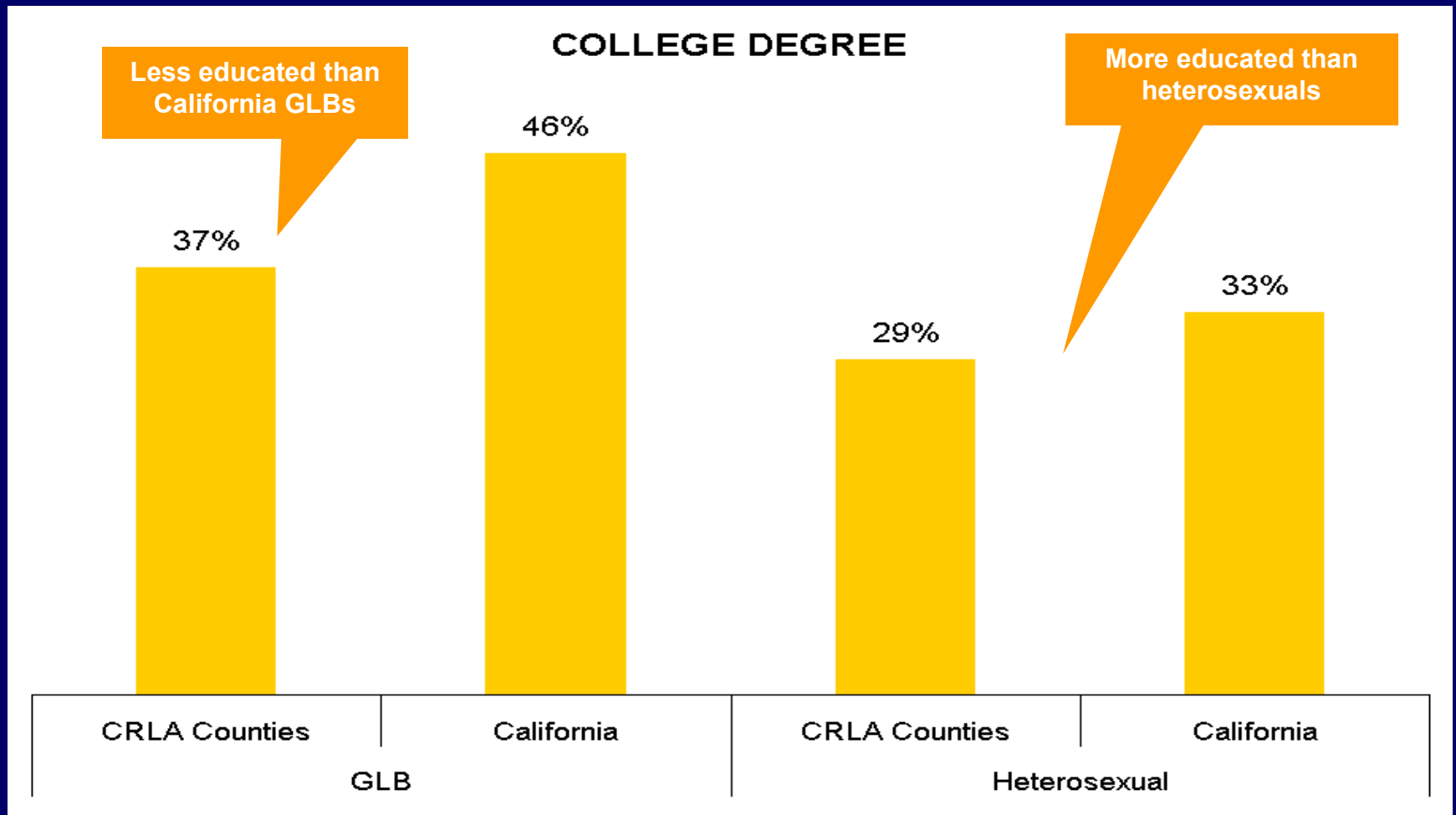

GLB population in CRLA counties is more Latino/a than statewide GLBs



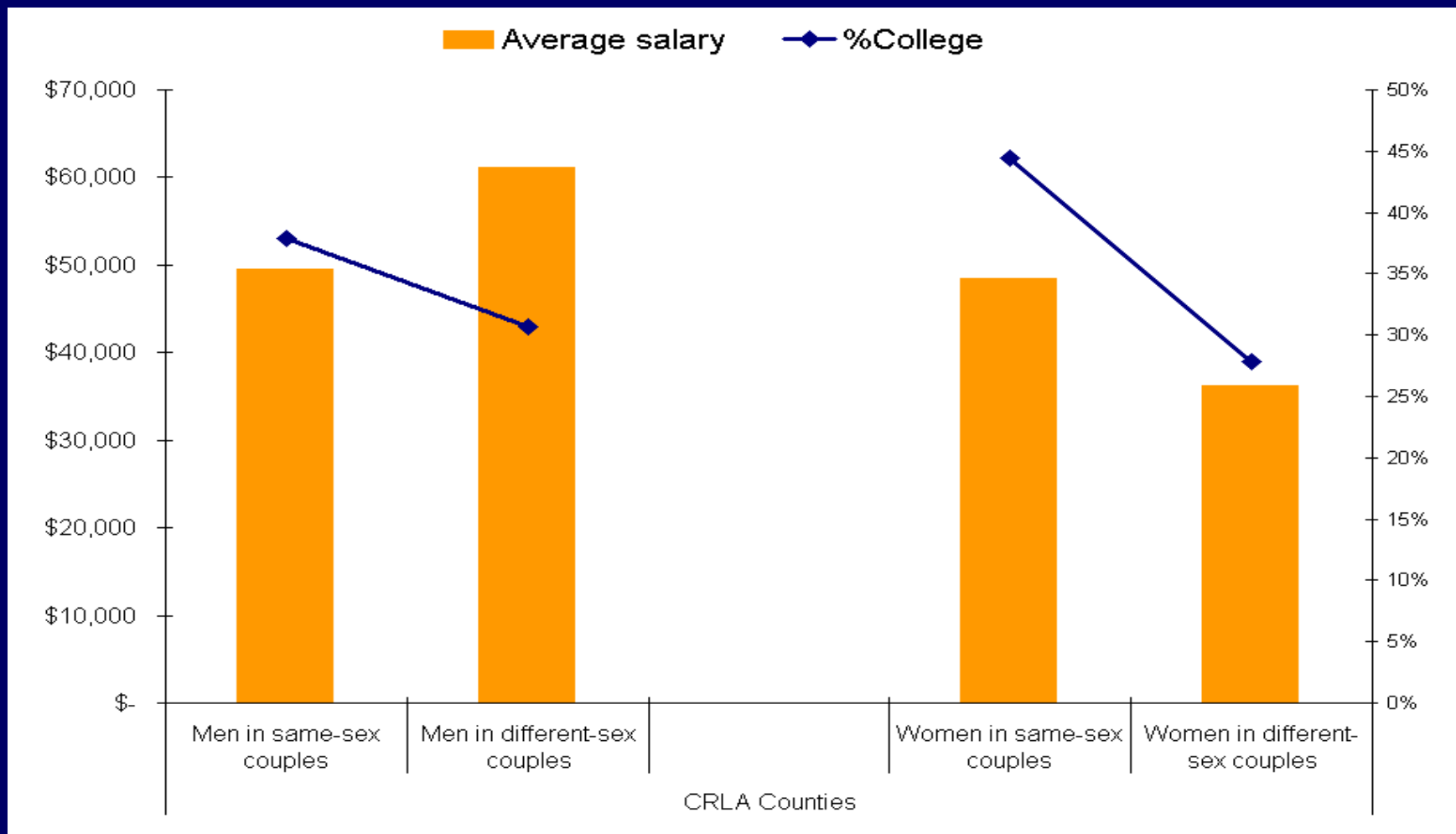

Many GLB in CRLA counties are economically disadvantaged



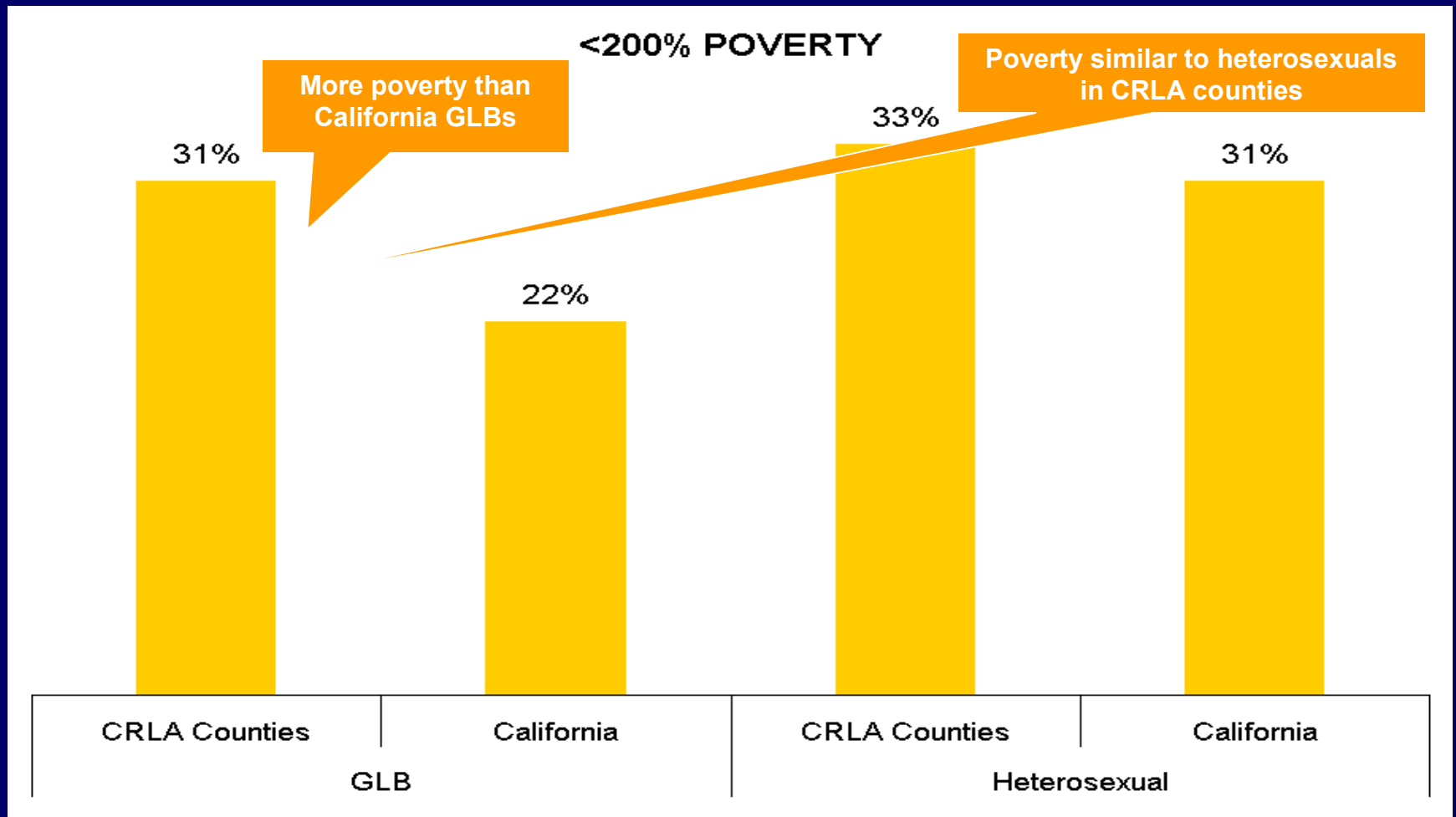

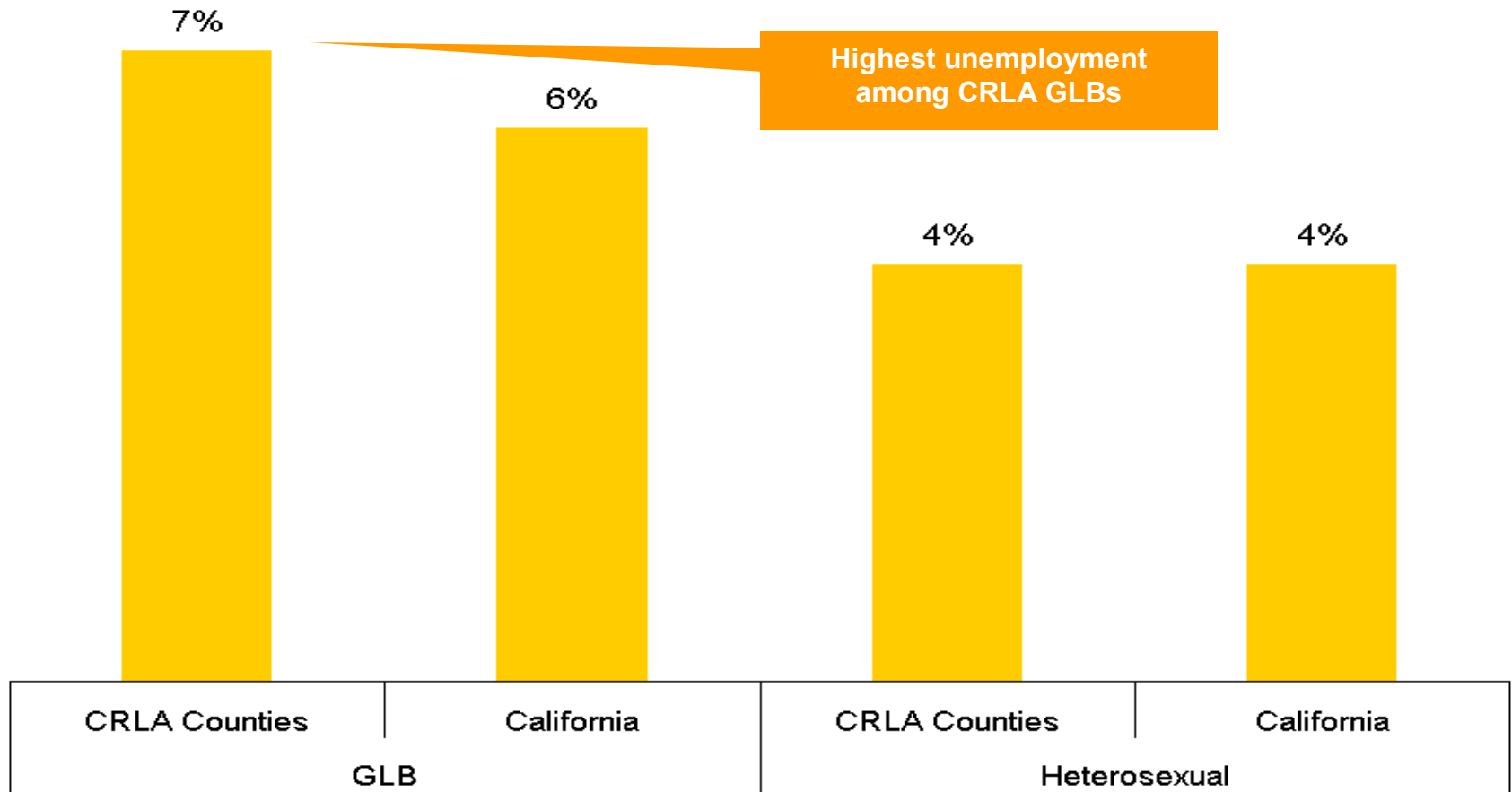

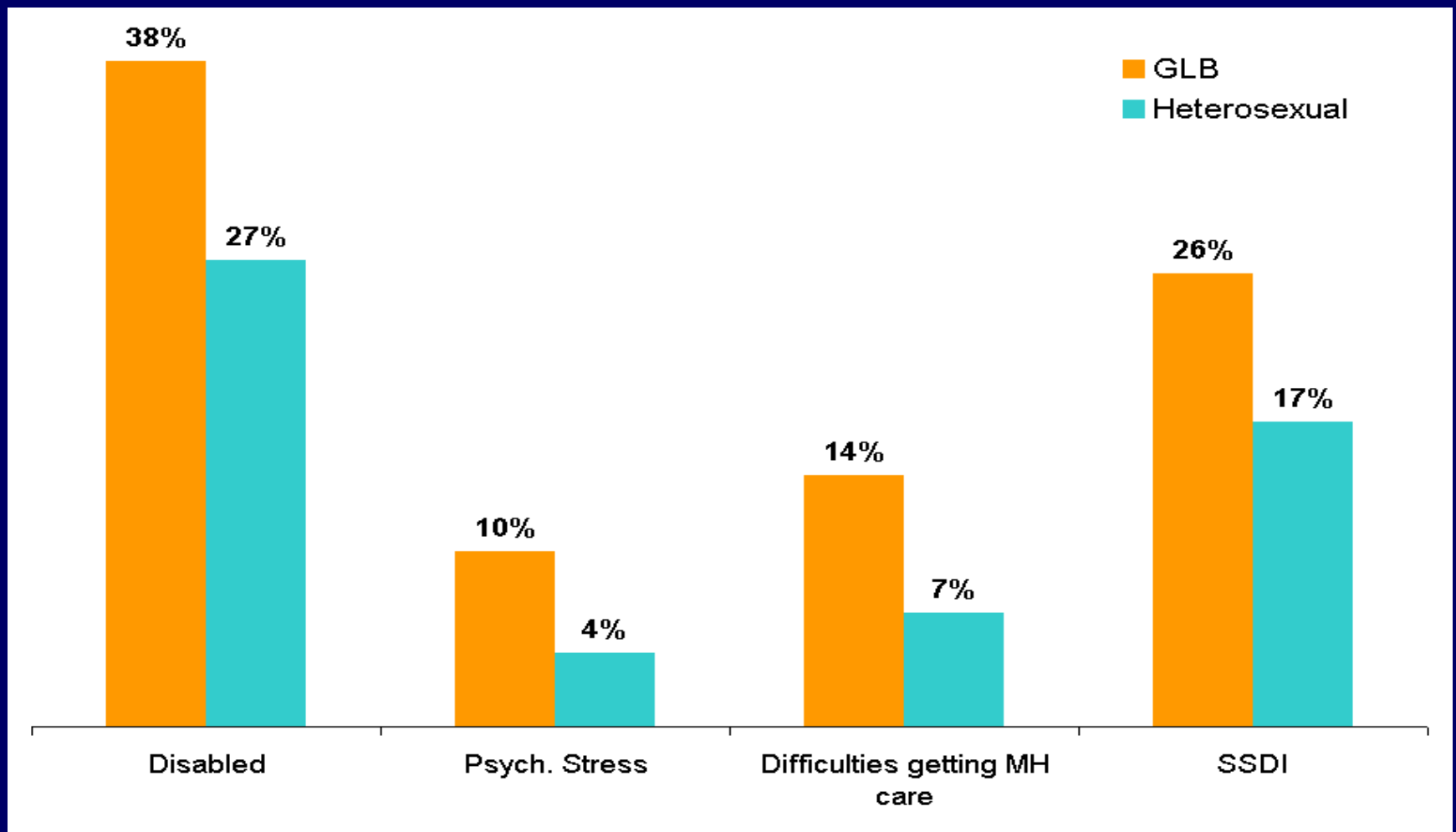

UNEMPLOYED



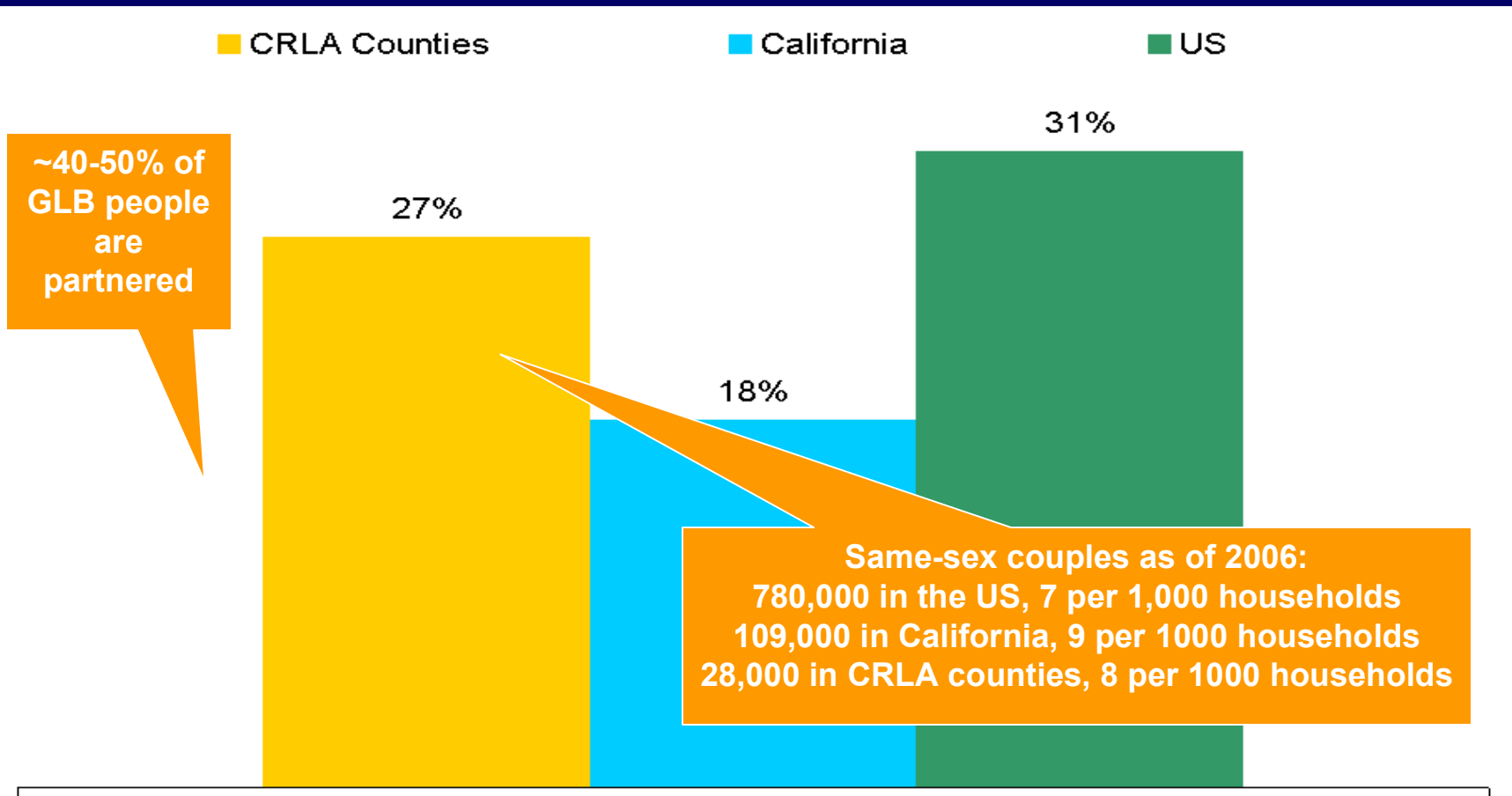

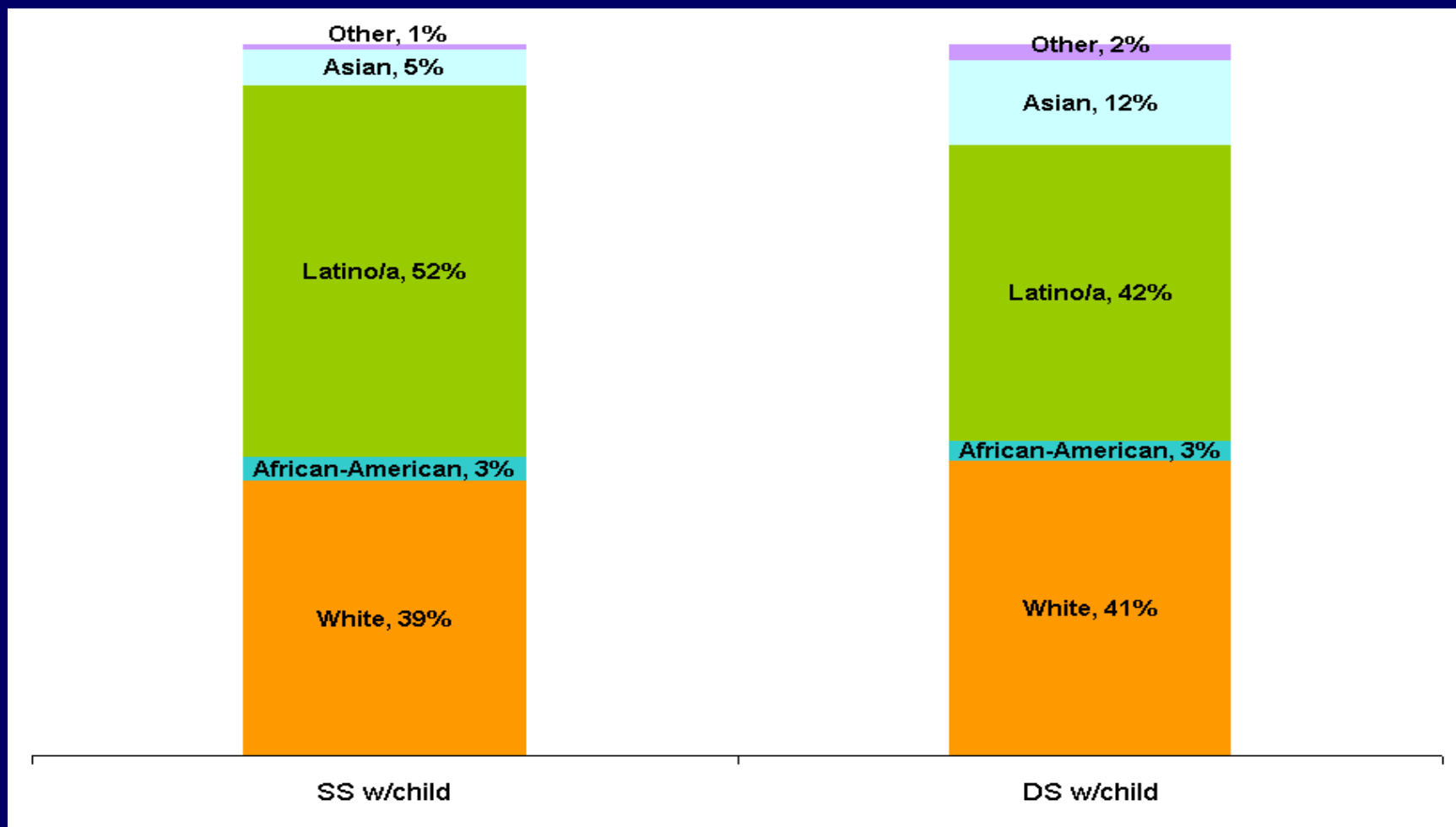

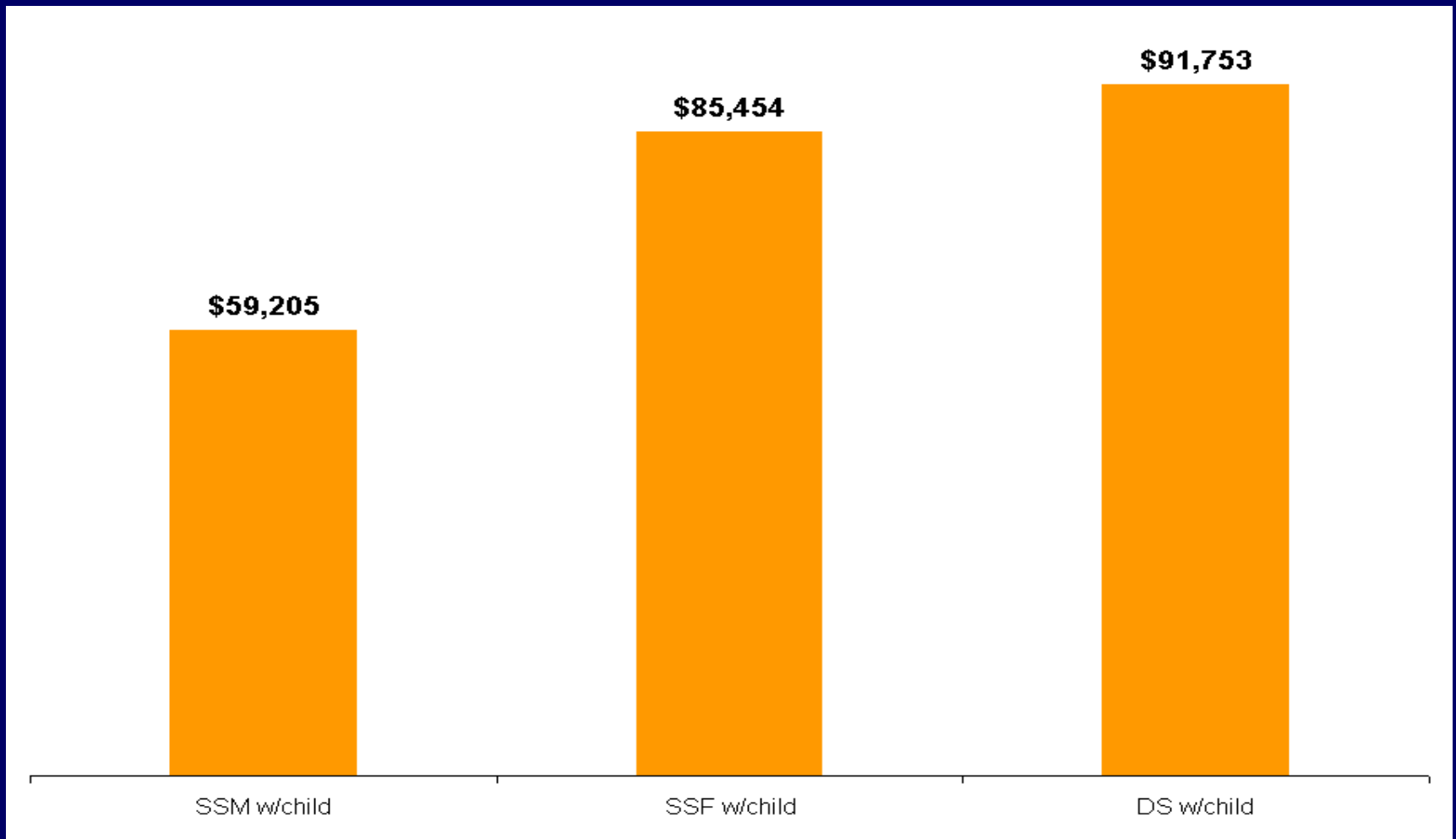

The counts in CRLA counties

- 136,000 GLB people
- 28,000 same-sex couples
 - 8,300 same-sex couples raising 17,000 children

GLB in CRLA counties vs. California

- Economically disadvantaged
- Health challenged
 - More likely to be disabled, report psychological stress, and report difficulties getting MH services
- Challenged in getting MH services
- “Coming out” at a faster rate
- More likely to be raising children

GLB vs. others in CRLA counties

- More educated, but despite this...
 - 1/3rd are poor (like heterosexuals)
 - Men in same-sex couples earn less than men in different-sex couples
- Health is challenged
- Same-sex couples with children are poorer than different-sex couples with kids
 - Less white and more Latino/a
